"Who killed the Diocese?"

This wasn't exactly the way the question was phrased, but recently someone asked why the diocese had been abolished. That hasn't really happened. It can't happen: a diocese is a canonical entity within the Episcopal Church and a legal entity under American law. The term comes from a Greek word meaning "administration;" no matter whether large or small a diocese is defined as the area administered by a bishop (the Greek roots of which word mean "over-seer"). But how we view this entity and the language we use for it have shifted, certainly here in Minnesota. What follows is a brief attempt to explain where we are now.

Sometime in the early 2000s, a group of congregational leaders in Minnesota, both clergy and laity, began to articulate that the Church of the 21st Century would need a more collaborative style of organization and leadership than the Church has practiced in the past. By 2005, the loose thinking of this group took shape as the *Mission Strategy Network* and the work it proposed as necessary for the continued growth and health of Episcopalians in Minnesota was formally adopted by our convention delegates. A report with recommendations for further work was adopted by the convention of 2008 and this ground-plan was then used to create the profile for the call of Bishop Prior. (Whether you're calling a vicar or a bishop, it's all about articulating a clear community vision and the goals that go with it, then finding the person with the right skills to fit the job!)

Two of the goals set early in this rethinking are particularly pertinent here: "to redevelop the entire diocese by the end of 2009 to function primarily as a decentralized network of faith communities [that will] exercise local initiative and responsibility for shared ministry in their contexts"; and

"for every congregation to connect or re-connect to ministry directly related to its particular mission field and become communities in which discipleship is a way of life for all God's people" (empowered grass roots renewal).

As part of living into a fuller expression of this new identity, the narrow ecclesiastical terminology of "Diocese of Minnesota" has been replaced by the use of "Episcopal Church in Minnesota," which is intended to embrace more clearly who we are as a network of faith communities, all called to transformation by engaging in God's mission but all in the particular manifestation of our various local contexts and cultures.

Organizationally, things have changed as well. The work of ECMN has been restructured into three areas—Mission, Ministry and Management giving us a new common language through which to engage in meaningful conversation. So too we have reorganized around geographic areas of the state, called "Mission Areas" to emphasize our common purpose: discovering, within our own communities, the gifts and grace God has planted here. When we "network," when we are connected to other faith communities in ministry, we can use all of our gifts—our time, talent, and resourcesmore collaboratively in new ways and participate more fully in God's mission, engaged and motivated by ideas that stretch us beyond what we're used to.



Calling a New Priest

During our annual meeting on February 17, the question was asked, "Exactly what is the process of calling the new priest and why does it say the Bishop 'appoints' the priest? Don't we have a say?" Let me start by saying that, yes, you will have a choice of candidates, but the list from which you get to choose will come from the Bishop. All candidates interested in the position will submit their inquiries to the Bishop's office; the Bishop and his advisory team will then review the applicants and select three to five who seem to exhibit the best "fit" for St. Andrew's, using as their criteria the profile you have just completed and provided to him. A St. Andrew's Search Committee will then decide who they want to interview, conduct those interviews, and finally recommend one candidate to the Bishop's Committee. After voting to endorse that choice (assuming they do!), the Bishop's Committee will then request the Bishop's final approval. Once they get that approval the Bishop will appoint the new priest to St. Andrew's and the Bishop's Committee will enter into a call process with that individual. (What exact form the call will take—whether it will be a call to the position of Vicar or Priest-in-charge--has not been determined at this time.) Most of this latter action will happen simultaneously, not as long-drawn-out process.

The prayerful oversight of Bishop Prior throughout this process is in part because he *is* the Bishop and all priests who enter the diocese do so only with his permission and oversight. This ensures that they meet the criteria he and the Commission on Ministry have identified as strengthening the Episcopal Church in Minnesota. The Bishop's involvement is greater in St. Andrew's case because you are a mission congregation and thus directly responsible to him as your Rector. The clergy in mission situations operate as the Bishop's appointed "staff" in a sense, and ultimate decisions about congregational matters are all referred to the Bishop's office for approval.

If all of these steps seem constrictive, it is important to note that Bishop Prior is all about greater local empowerment, not less. (see this month's Logoi article). He is, in fact, giving you a greater voice in finding your next clergy partner than you have ever had before. Although your last two vicars were interviewed for the position, essentially Bishop Robert Anderson appointed Cindy Peterson-Wlosinski and Bishop Philip McNairy appointed John Husband. And most will not remember that from your founding up into the 1950s the position of vicar was filled by clergy on the staff of the Cathedral of the Holy Trinity, all appointed by the Bishop of Duluth (when there was a Diocese of Duluth). So here is your chance to take full responsibility for your own future; may you choose wisely, with God's help!
